

The N. Y. Courier & Enquirer asserted a few days since, that "a resolution had been prepared — by the bank commissioners, to offer to the convention, denouncing the U. S. Bank, but they became alarmed, and it was stricken out." We declared the assertion to be a fabrication in all its parts, no such resolution having been prepared by the commissioners or any other member, or presented to or stricken out by the convention. The C. & E. now tacitly abandons its invention, so far as it applies to the bank commissioners, but asserts that "a resolution was prepared to be passed by the late state convention, and that it was suppressed in consequence of one or two leading members, one of whom voted for the resolution in the assembly, declaring that they would oppose it, or modify it so as to make it favourable to a modified re-charter." The whole story is a fabrication of the C. & E. The Surveyor, and his lieutenant, are challenged to name their men. We do not allude to the matter, as material in itself, but as a further proof how soon apathy becomes as reckless of a character for truth and veracity as of political consistency.
