The Bank committee have not yet returned to the house of representatives, nor do we hear any thing definite of their doings. It is surmised, we perceive, by the New-York papers, that the committee have discovered that, in the course of its business, the Bank has lent money to some publishers of newspapers, and it is spoken of as if it were something extraordinary. It would be surprising, on the contrary, considering the nature of the printing business, if money were not sometimes obtained on loan to carry it on; and we know of no institution so able to render this profession reasonable accommodation as the Bank of the United States. If it has been as willing as able, the more to its credit. We hope it will appear that the bank has never lost any thing by assisting the chief of the mechanic arts; and we trust that no one who lives by printing has any other objection to a full disclosure of his Bank transactions than that which every man of any delicacy has to an improper interference with his private accounts.
