Notwithstanding the ribaldry of the Courier and Enquirer, and its satellite the Pennsylvania Inquirer, we still believe that the editors of the Courier and Enquirer have had the sum of \$52,975 on the notes of M. M. Noah and James Watson Webb, and no other security. We believe that Jesper Harding of the Pennsylvania Inquirer has had \$18,000 on security, little, if any better than that of the editors of the Courier and Enquirer. We believe that Gales and Seaton have had one or more large loans on terms and under circumstances calculated to destroy all confidence in the management of the bank. We believe that Silas E. Burrows has had more money from the bank than any investigation yet made will show, and we put it to every honest man in the community, whether the fact of this Mr. Burrow's avoiding the sub cenas of the bank committee is not of itself sufficient indication that the half has not been told of him. Will the Pennsylvania Inquirer tell us where Mr. Burrows is, or was during the sitting of the committee? Will the Courier explain its silence? He was their friend. He did negotiate for them. They do not-dare not deny it: their Thursday's article is a plea of guilty.
