

MR. ADAMS'S REPORT.

Since our notice of Mr. McDuffie's report was in type, we have received from an attentive Washington correspondent the long and lucid statement on the subject of the United States Bank made by Mr. Adams. It sustains Mr. McDuffie in every particular, and goes further in its general character of the unimpeachable integrity with which its affairs are conducted. Mr. Whitney comes out small. See the annexed sentence—

"The President of the Bank, confronted with Whitney, declared, upon oath, that there was not one word of truth in his statement of his interview with him. And Mr. Whitney was left with his ragged memorandum, and his oath, falsified by the concurring oaths of the five individuals, who with certainty of knowledge could contradict him."

The subject of Webb & Noak is treated very fairly, in a way to prove the entire sufficiency of the security. He denies the right of the committee to search into private accounts, and on the whole we think the report must satisfy even the most bitter enemy of the bank that the original report of the majority was a partial, misguided and unfair exposition.
