POSTSCRIPT.

THE COUNTER REPORT of J. Q. Adams, of the committee appointed to examine and report on the books and proceedings of the U. S. Bank, was submitted to the H. of R. on Monday; -it occupies nearly 17 columns of the National Intelligencer of Tuesday. From a cursory glance at the scope of the report, it appears to us to be an erudite and labored critique on the financial views of the majority, with some forced attempts at pleasantry, and a quotation or two from Shakspeare's "Much ado about nothing"-a character of which the report appears to partake largely. Mr. A. also animadverts freely on the course pursued in the investigation, by the majority-and expresses his dissent particularly to the range of inquiry taken relative to the official conduct of the President and Directors of the Bank, and the private business of editors and others; as not being, in his opinion, within the scope of the labors assigned to the committee.
