In April last, the Bank Committee brought our account with the United States Bank before the public, and endeavored to fasten upon the institution the charge of corrupting the Press. We laid a full and frank statement before the public, and even a majority of our enemies admitted the failure of the Committee to establish their point. We were then advocating the reelection of ANDREW JACKSON to the Presidency, and the Washington Globe and Richmond Enquirer, saw nothing improper in the transaction.
